The regular meeting of Mifflinburg Borough Council was called to order at 7:00 PM.

Mr. Justin Keister, of Larson Design Group, is present at tonight's meeting on behalf of Mr. Dave Gutelius regarding the sidewalks for the 8th Street Development. Mr. Keister informed Borough Council that he and Mr. Gutelius are working with the Mifflinburg Planning Commission to put through the Subdivision and Land Development Plans for the 8th Street Development. These plans were designed without sidewalks or curbing. Borough Council direction is requested with determining the necessity of sidewalks and curbing. Mr. Keister presented Borough Council with a copy of the proposed site plan and an aerial view for the 8th Street Development. Mr. Rowe clarified that this is a unique situation and is kind of the same situation as with the proposed plans for Mr. Dominick T. Adamo, Owner/Director of Dominick T. Adamo Funeral Home, new Funeral Home at the corner of Walnut and Line Streets.

Mayor Cooney expressed that whenever possible, he personally likes to see sidewalks installed; it provides a protective buffer for pedestrians. A lengthy discussion was held; Mr. Bottiger disagreed with Mayor Cooney and stated that he believes in a situation like this, where it's kind of out of the way, he doesn't see how sidewalks or curbing are going to be beneficial.

71 sewage will not create a hydraulic overload, an organic overload, or a 5 year projected overload in the
72 facilities. Borough Council action is requested to submit a permit amendment to DEP for an additional
73 27 EDU's for the proposed development.

84 Mr. Duane Zimmerman informed Borough Council that he requested to be placed on tonight's agenda to
85 represent a small group of hard working people with regard to the Borough using the parking area at the
86 Harry Haney Park, located along N. 8th Street, for a staging/storage area for millings during their paving
87 project each year. This year, one of the dump trucks hit the electrical wire and took out the mainline
88 fuse causing the power in this area to go out. Mr. Zimmerman stated that he thinks the Borough needs
89 to stop using the parking area at the Harry Haney Park for a staging/storage area for millings during their
90 paving project; there are a lot of other places that the Borough can use. Mr. Zimmerman clarified that
91 he thinks the Borough needs to come up with a better plan. A lengthy discussion was held; Mrs.
92 Hackenberg directed Mr. Rowe to determine how much of the millings the Borough would use and then
93 get rid of the rest.
94

95 Mr. Seth and Cathy Neuhauser, residents of 3 Oak Avenue, attended tonight's meeting along with Mr.
96 Chris and Gina Zarr, residents of 8 Oak Avenue, regarding the blighted property located at 1 Oak
97 Avenue. Mr. Neuhauser expressed that they appreciate that the Borough mows the grass; however the
98 trees and bushes that are planted along the property are obstructing the view of traffic, making it unsafe
99 when pulling out. Mr. Neuhauser inquired what the Borough plans were with regard to the blighted
100 property and its disposition.
101

102 Mr. Runkle reported that the Borough could definitely take care of the trees and bushes that are
103 obscuring the view of traffic. Mr. Runkle explained that the Borough has taken enforcement action
104 under the Property Maintenance Code, which they do through the Central Keystone Council of
105 Governments (CK-COG), the Enforcement Agent for that ordinance. The challenge with moving
106 forward with any further enforcement action on the property is the fact that the property owner is
107 deceased and has been for some time and there was never an estate opened. The Borough has the power
108 to demo the property and then lien the property for the costs incurred which is practically worthless
109 since there is debt against the property that far exceeds its value. The Borough has been through this
110 kind of situation before and it turned out to be nothing but an expense with little or no money recovered.
111 Mr. Runkle clarified that the Borough has not forgotten about the property; the Borough's has taken a
112 wait and see approach, to see if there is a solution that doesn't cost all of the taxpayers' money. There
113 have been a bunch of people that have expressed their interest in property including Mr. Dave Gutelius.
114 There may be someone who wants to pay the money to demo the property and then redevelop or flip it.
115 The question for Borough Council is how long do they want to wait and see.
116

117 Mr. Zimmerman expressed that he thinks this wait and see approach that the Borough is doing is
118 disrespectful to all of the rate payers and that he would like to see the Borough take a more serious look
119 at the blighted property. Mr. Runkle advised Borough Council that he thinks they should wait another
120 three (3) or four (4) months to see how things progress with Mr. Dave Gutelius's development on 8th
121 Street. A lengthy discussion was held; Borough Council directed Mrs. Metzger to contact Mr. Dave
122 Gutelius to obtain a quote to demolish the property.
123

124 Mr. Chris Zarr stated that with the 8th Street Development, Mr. Dave Gutelius will be selling lots and
125 inquired if he could purchase the lot next to him to put a pole shed. Mr. Runkle directed Mr. Zarr to
126 contact Mr. David Hines, Zoning Administrator for the CK-COG.

147 from the Central Keystone Council of Governments (CK-COG). Mrs. Metzger reported that she sent the
148 letter to the CK-COG requesting more detail for the Borough zoning services as directed by Borough
149 Council at last month's meeting. Mr. Berkheiser met with Mr. Brubaker, president of the CK-COG
150 Board, to express concern with the billings as well. The CK-COG requested that another meeting with
151 her and Mr. Berkheiser be held to discuss this matter further. A meeting was held earlier today; the CK-
152 COG has ensured her and Mr. Berkheiser that they'll have more detail on the itemized zoning invoice by
153 next month's bill. Mrs. Metzger informed Borough Council that at the meeting Mr. Chad Smith,
154 Director of the CK-COG, also informed her of an impending rate increase for the Rental Property
155 Ordinance. Mrs. Metzger stated that if they want her to, she can obtain prices from other companies. A
156 discussion was held; Mrs. Hackenberg directed Mrs. Metzger to obtain prices from other companies.

157
158 Mrs. Metzger informed Borough Council that she received and had Mrs. Hackenberg execute an
159 extension of the Elm Street Grant for New Communities Program Elm Street Project until May 14,
160 2018. Borough Council action is requested to formally approve the extension of this grant. The next
161 step will be to find a project that the Department of Community & Economic Development (DCED) can
162 approve for the funds remaining that will qualify as a Residential Reinvestment Project.

227 Mr. Rowe provided Borough Council with an update on the status of the Walnut Street Project. Mr.
228 Rowe reported that the Walnut Street Project has been deemed substantially complete and the walk
229 through was held on Thursday, June 30, 2016. The street was open and used for the 4th of July 5K. The
230 following concerns have been expressed:

- 231
- 232 • Mr. Harvey and Brenda Ilgen, residents of 421 Walnut Street, expressed concerns about a
233 set of steps and some railing at their property. The Borough built the steps and railing to
234 meet the sidewalk grade in accordance with ADA requirements and there is now an extra
235 step. They were looking at compromising with the Borough on installing some handrails
236 on their steps so pedestrians don't walk into the extra step that's now at the bottom
 - 237
238 • Mr. James Mitchell, a resident of 422 Walnut Street, expressed concerns of personal
239 property damage to his front porch during the Walnut Street Project. Mr. Mitchell was
240 concerned that Fairchild Brothers, Inc. caused separation of porch railings and porch roof
241 supports from the corner porch post as well as porch flooring boards heaving. Fortunately
242 for the Borough and for Fairchild Brothers, Inc. video and photographic documentation of
243 the entire project area is required, both before and after construction, as proof of existing
244 conditions prior to construction. Mr. Rowe informed Borough Council that he met with
245 Fairchild Brothers, Inc. and reviewed the photographic records of the existing conditions
246 prior to construction. There is significant evidence in the video and photos that show the
247 same conditions existed prior to construction and Fairchild Brothers, Inc. should be in no
248 way responsible for repairs of any of these issues. A letter was presented to Mr. Mitchell in
249 person; however he may not be satisfied with this response.
 - 250
251 • Mr. Steve Weaver, a resident of 417 Walnut Street, expressed concerns about drainage on
252 the street. Mr. Rowe reported that he and Mr. Jason Mitchell, the Borough Public Works
253 Supervisor, were out several time during storm events; the street appears to be draining
254 really well and there doesn't seem to be any standing water issues.

255
256 Mr. Rowe informed Borough Council that Fairchild Brothers, Inc. has submitted Payment Application
257 No. 3 in the amount of \$189,186.51 and Change Order No. 1 for a price increase of \$11,457.24 for the
258 Walnut Street Project. A copy of the payment application and the change order have been included in
259 the information tonight. Both the payment application and the change order have been reviewed by Uni-
260 Tec Consulting Engineers, Inc. and Borough Management and are recommended for payment.

288 Mrs. Metzger reported that she received notification that the Green Light GO Grant application that
289 Borough Management submitted to PennDOT last February for the upgrading of the SR 45 and Mabel
290 Street Traffic Signal to video detection has been awarded. Borough Management has obtained some
291 additional information and reviewed the award and determined that there is not enough money in the
292 budget to complete this work this year. Mrs. Metzger explained that the Borough misunderstood what
293 was involved on their end to proceed with this project. The Borough was under the impression from the
294 original program application that they would be responsible just for the work and match associated with
295 installing new signalization equipment. It was the Borough's original understanding that PennDOT
296 would address and bear any cost related to engineering design and permitting. The Borough has since
297 found out that PennDOT is not covering these costs and this work would be completed by the Borough.
298 The Borough is still in need of upgrading this signal to a current video detection signalization system
299 and will be requesting information regarding any funding programs to assist with costs associated with
300 engineering design and re-permitting.

301
302 Mr. Steese stated that there seems to be a lot of traffic issues at the SR 45 and 4th Street intersection and
303 inquired what Borough Council's thoughts were on obtaining a delayed turn signal at this intersection.
304 Mr. Steese explained that vehicles traveling west on SR 45 who want to turn left (south) on 4th Street are
305 often forced to wait causing all other westbound traffic to queue behind them. This causes the traffic to
306 queue back as far east as 2nd Street or even further east. A discussion was held; Mrs. Metzger clarified
307 that a traffic study would be required to analyze traffic flow, and to help determine what, if any, measure
308 would be recommended to improve this intersection and traffic flows in this area.

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332 Mrs. Metzger informed Borough Council that she has become aware that there are a significant number
333 of trees (over 90) in the Harry Haney Park, located along N. 8th Street, that have died due to the Ash
334 Borer disease. These trees are in the wooded area that surrounds the kids fishing area and along the
335 eastern tree line and will require removal. This area is adjacent to the Merrill Lynn Conservancy trails
336 and property and some of the affected trees may belong to the conservancy or be a border tree. Borough
337 Management met with Mr. Gerald Hoy, of the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural
338 Resources (DCNR), to determine how dangerous these trees are and what is recommended for removal.
339 Some of these trees are very large and the Borough may require assistance for safe removal. Mr. Hoy is
340 suggesting that the Borough bid the work as a timber sale and has volunteered to provide sample bids for
341 a timber sale and to mark the trees that require removal. Mr. Hoy is also suggesting that a meeting be
342 held with the property owners that are located adjacent to the park to review the condition of the trees at
343 or surrounding the park, so that they are aware of the problem and can take action with regard to their
344 property. A discussion was held; Borough Council directed the Borough to post warning signs at the
345 park and proceed with having a timber sale.

346
347 Mrs. Metzger announced that she was approached by Mrs. Ada Sampsell, a resident of 89 Shipton
348 Street. Mrs. Sampsell owns a tree located near the Borough's electric easement which has been trimmed
349 by Borough employees previously as part of their line maintenance work. Mrs. Sampsell claims that the
350 trimming was not done correctly and she was promised removal of this tree about three (3) years ago.
351 Mrs. Sampsell would like the Borough to remove her tree now. In accordance with the Borough's
352 policy, the Borough does not perform private work for residents; what they do for one, they must be
353 prepared to do for all others. Mrs. Metzger stated that she explained the Borough's policy to Mrs.
354 Sampsell; however Mrs. Sampsell feels that she is due an exception to this policy because she was
355 promised removal previously. Borough Council direction/action is requested on this matter.

378 Department to film two (2) short scenes. The firm anticipates that it would take two (2) twelve (12)
379 hour days to film these scenes. A discussion was held; Mayor Cooney indicated that he would inform
380 the firm that Borough Council is not interest.

382 Chief Bickhart presented Borough Council with some Monthly Highlights for the Mifflinburg Police
383 Department for June 2016.

402 Wednesday, July 6, 2016. There were four (4) applications received. The Mifflinburg Civil Service
403 Commission is currently in the process of testing; the following test have been scheduled:

407 Chief Bickhart provided Borough Council with an update on the status of the applications for the part-
408 time Police Officer position for the Mifflinburg Police Department. Chief Bickhart reported that so far,
409 seven (7) applications have been received.

411 Mayor Cooney conducted a presentation to Police Chief Douglas R. Bickhart. Mayor Cooney informed
412 Borough Council that he has prepared a Service Proclamation thanking Chief Bickhart for his years of
413 service to the Mifflinburg Police Department, which reads as follows:

415 WHEREAS, Police Chief Douglas R. Bickhart retired from the Mifflinburg Police
416 Department effective July 29, 2016, and,

417
418 WHEREAS, Chief Bickhart served dutifully and with distinction, integrity and honor, as a
419 valued member of the Police Department for a total of 27 years, and,

420
421 WHEREAS, Chief Bickhart started as a Patrolman in 1989 and became Chief of Police in
422 2003, and,

423
424 WHEREAS, Chief Bickhart, both in and out of uniform, set a commendable example for
425 the men and women of our Police Department, and,

426
427 WHEREAS, Chief Bickhart made an impact on the youth of our community through his
428 efforts as a D.A.R.E. instructor, and,

429
430 NOW THEREFORE, I, DAVID M. COONEY, Mayor of the Borough of Mifflinburg,
431 County of Union and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, on behalf of the Mifflinburg Police
432 Department and the Mifflinburg Borough Council and our residents, wish Chief Bickhart and
433 his family good health and happiness, and do hereby honor and commend Chief Bickhart for
434 his many years of service to our community.

435
436 Mayor Cooney presented Chief Bickhart with a framed copy of the Service Proclamation that Mayor
437 Cooney read at tonight's meeting, a thank-you letter from Borough Council which was signed by all
438 Borough Council Members and the Mayor, a professional staff portrait of Chief Bickhart, as well as a
439 shadow box which displayed his original badge from when he first started, his current badge, color
440 brass, nametag, and a Mifflinburg Police Department patch.

454 3. The gentleman that had a showroom for his construction displays has closed up shop at 508
455 Chestnut Street

457 4. The Barbershop will be closing up shop at 701 Walnut Street and relocating to 314
458 Chestnut Street.
- 459
460 5. Twisted Bull Restaurant has closed up shop at 60 E. Chestnut Street.
- 461
462 6. Rishel's Meats will be closing up shop at 701 Walnut Street. Mr. Dave Hendrick,
463 Hendricks Enterprises, has purchased Rishel's Meat and will be reopening the business at
464 60 E. Chestnut Street.

466 Mrs. Hackenberg informed Borough Council that they received a copy of the Engineer's Report for July
467 2016 included in the information tonight.

465 Mrs. Metzger provided Borough Council with an update on the status of the 3rd Street Bridge
466 Replacement Project.

467
468 Mr. Runkle requested an executive session to discuss potential litigation.

470 Mayor Cooney informed Borough Council that he participated in or will be participating in the
